

A brief guide to

FUNDING AND SUPPORT FOR RAF CHILDREN IN SCHOOLS

This booklet highlights some of the organisations offering support or resources - including funding - but there are many more.

FUND (ESF)

Funding is available to state-funded schools, Trusts or Local Authorities on behalf of schools, to mitigate the effects of exceptional mobility, separation and deployment for Service children.

The latest round opened on 1 June 2020 and closes midday 7 October 2020 for funding in 2021. See RAF FF's Envoy article in <u>Summer 2020</u> for some hints and tips. Search <u>gov.uk</u> for 'MOD support fund for schools' to access guidance and examples of successful bids.

THE ARMED FORCES COVENANT FUND TRUST

The Trust runs a number of different funding programmes aimed at supporting Armed Forces families and veterans in their communities.

THE RAF BENEVOLENT FUND

The RAF Benevolent Fund's External and RAF Station Grants schemes are not open to applications from Schools and other education providers. However they do support individual families and provide considerable funding to children and young people on units and stations around the UK. They fund Airplay youth clubs and Airplay Connect to connect those further away. They have recently extended their free counselling sessions to include children and young people. LOCAL AUTHORITIES (LAs)

CONNECT WITH THE RAF AND MINISTRY OF DEFENCE (MOD)

THE ARMED FORCES EDUCATION TRUST

Charity working for children and young people whose education has been compromised or at risk as a result of their parents' past or current service. The collective grants scheme makes awards to an education provider (normally a school or education authority) to help provide educational support for service pupils.

Matt Blyton, Senior Education Adviser, North Yorkshire County Council - advice for ESF bids

DO give careful thought to sustainability – grants that have longer term impact are likely to be more persuasive than 'one-offs', particularly if they improve systems and procedures.

DO collaborate - collaborative bids carry more weight than single-school ones, since more Service children benefit. This is even more so for schools with small numbers of Armed Forces children on roll.

DON'T submit if you cannot evidence high levels of deployment or exceptional mobility - your bid won't be scrutinised unless one of these conditions is met. As a general rule of thumb, an annual mobility rate of 20% is considered to be quite high (but probably wouldn't be considered 'exceptional').

DON'T forget to consult with others, especially within the military and local authority – bids are stronger when these stakeholders have been involved and provide supporting statements.

DO provide staff training to raise awareness of the issues faced by youngsters from RAF families.

DO provide opportunities for these youngsters to share the issues which are important to them and really listen to what they are saying.

DON'T assume that you know what these young people are feeling and that they just "get on with" the challenges they may face because it is part of their lives – you need to hear it from the young people themselves.

DON'T underestimate the emotional impact of being separated from a loved one and the effect that may have on behaviour and motivation in school.

DO be crystal clear about your theory of change - how your work will lead to the intended impact.

DO provide the best quality evidence you can for your assertions.

DON'T assume that funders know you and your work well - tell them.

DON'T forget to build in evaluation, if allowed - plan to learn from your work and show you are serious about it.

DO provide evidence of need of the actual cohort of children rather than a sterotypical account. All children are different, we want to know about what will support children in the applicants' context.

DO ask yourself, before submitting 'will this activity contribute to a better understanding of what works in supporting service children to thrive?'

DO always read all of the guidance provided thoroughly. It contains everything you will need for making a good application. Remember to ask questions if you are unsure of anything.

DO ensure you have consulted with Service families as well as other delivery partners such as the local unit or Armed Forces Charity, before making an application. You need to show us that if we provide funding for your project that people will want to access it. Funding is competitive and we want you to provide the strongest case for need and to prove your project is the right one at the right time to meet those needs. e.g. You might want a new outdoor learning facility... but how will that support the Service children specifically?

DON'T spend too much time talking about overall statistics and providing general information – we want to know specifically about the children you support directly, what you will do to meet the priority. Why? and how?

DON'T leave your application to the last day before closing. You need to allow plenty of time to read and digest both the guidence and application form questions, and to ensure you have drafted/saved your answers offline first in case of any technical issues.
